Proseminar Virtue and Knowledge in Plato's Meno

Wintersemester 2023/24

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Time and Venue: Tuesdays 10–12 c.t., Hörsaal, Doblerstraße 33, first floor

Description: the *Meno* is a fascinating philosophical conversation about two topics which are

central to Plato's thought and to philosophy in general: moral excellence or virtue (aretê) and

knowledge (epistêmê). The Meno focuses on the question of whether virtue is teachable, which

it links to the deeper question of whether virtue consists in knowledge. The attempt at

answering these questions leads the interlocutors to examine the very nature of knowledge and

the difference between knowledge and mere true opinion (doxa) - fundamental themes of

epistemology. In this Proseminar we will study the Meno in depth, each session focusing on

the analysis and assessment of the philosophical ideas and arguments in a particular part of the

text. No prior acquaintance with Plato's works will be presupposed. We will study the *Meno*

in translation. Participants will be expected to participate actively and to give short

presentations, which are meant to introduce parts of the text and to raise questions for the

discussion.
